Albany First Christian Church Board Meeting Jan. 13, 2025

1) **Minutes** of the November board meeting and the Dec. 8 congregational meeting were revised and OK'd by consensus.

2) **Pastor's Report:** Not much to add to the written report presented. The pastors are pleased and excited for the time ahead and thank people who said yes to the nominating committee.

3) Treasurer's Report: The good news is that we finished 2024 with a budget surplus of about \$23.000. The question is what to do with this money. It could be transferred to the contingency fund and would bring that fund to about 40,000. We could send some to the endowment fund. We could do nothing but keep it in the checking account. After some discussion, Gary Goby moved that we transfer to the contingency fund an amount that would bring us up to one month's budgeted expenses and send the rest to the foundation. Nadine Wood seconded the motion, and it passed with a unanimous vote.

4) Property Committee Report: We are keeping up with our maintenance well, but the next thing likely to need work or replacement is our water heater. It is still working, but if we got a bid on fixing it, we would be better able to plan for the expense. Kris McLaughlin moved that Gary get a bid for that, and Paula Moore seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

5) **New Business:** As orientation at this first meeting, Graham had each board member tell where they were born. Gayle Dee read the board intentions. We learned that the church is moving forward on clarifying the functions of the Board and Program Cabinet, and that some reports currently coming to the Board will need to go to the Program Cabinet. Graham gave a brief tour of the FCC website, which has resources and forms for us all to use.

6) Old Business: The choir director search has not been successful locally and has expanded to Salem. Graham contacted Willamette University and is trying to contact the Corban University music department. We are not offering much money for this position, which likely makes it less attractive to applicants. Discussion of possible actions to take included special music and paying section leaders to help with the congregational singing. Allison Ruari said that she would be willing, for a season, to meet with singers once a week to prepare the week's hymns and also to rehearse for an anthem once a month. Kris McLaughlin moved that we accept Allison's offer to work with singers weekly for practice with hymns and a monthly anthem, and Paula Moore seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

7) Board Reports beyond the reports already received in writing:

• **Personnel Committee**: Paula Moore reported that the committee had discussed a proposed revision to the Personnel Handbook, which was approved by the board.

Community Meal: Dulca Bailey reported that 5,620 meals were served in 2024.

Annual reports from each committee meed to be turned in by Jan. 22.

8) Action Items from this meeting:

- 1. Cam will use the surplus to raise the contingency fund to a month's expenses and send the remainder to the Christian Church Foundation
- 2. Gary will get a bid on the water heater.
- 3. Cam will bring the budget up to date for presentation at the upcoming annual meeting.
- 4. Graham will contact Corban University and follow up with Willamette about possible choir conductor candidates.
- 5. Allison will commence informal choir rehearsals.
- 6. Everybody will submit their annual reports to the church office

1. Welcome. Congregational Co-Chair Graham Kislingbury opened the meeting at about 11:20 a.m. thanking those who brought soups and others who helped in some way with the lunch meeting.

2. Financial Report. Treasurer Cam Shuck reported that we finished the year with a surplus of \$23,581.95, with giving for December at \$42,751.17. To bring the YTD General Fund balance to 0 to start the year, the board on Jan. 13 voted to transfer \$10,000 to the Contingency Fund and directed Cam to deposit \$13,581.95 in the Foundational Memorial Fund.

3. Pastors' Report. Pastor Jared gave a recap of 2024 and praised the church practice of hospitality and welcome.

4. Recognition of officers, board and committee members. Allison recognized the work of those who completed their terms in 2024, including Charlotte Houser, who served for 13 years as a financial secretary and lead.

5) Special recognition. Graham recognized Gayle Dee for her two years of leadership as Congregational Co-Chair and for guiding our Technology Team. Gayle received flowers, a beautiful commemorative plate made by Chet Houser and an Amazon Gift Card.

6. Commissioning. Allison read a commissioning liturgy for incoming officers, board and committee members.

7. Open mic. Graham asked that anyone who uses the Ferry Street doors when they leave church to make sure that the door on the left is latched and cannot be opened from the outside. That particular door just needs a firm push from the outside.

8. Honored Member. Graham and Congregational Co-Chair Dianne Hargrove read a script that ended with Dianne announcing Nancy Marshall as our 2024 Honored Member. Nancy received flowers, her name engraved on our most recent Honored Member plaque and a Garland's Nursery gift card.

9. Closing. We sang a lively version of "The Lord's Prayer" and the meeting adjourned at 12:10 p.m.

Sensitive Locations FAQ for Houses of Worship February 5, 2025

NOTE: This is not legal advice and does not substitute consultation with a lawyer.

What has changed and what has remained the same regarding immigration enforcement in houses of worship?

On the first day of the new Trump administration, <u>the Department of Homeland Security</u> <u>withdrew a memo</u> setting guidelines that restricted enforcement action in certain locations, including places of worship. While the policy and restrictions on the agency has changed, the rights of the houses of worship have not. Houses of worship have Fourth Amendment rights to protect private spaces in their building from entry by immigration enforcement officers and any other law enforcement.

What are "Sensitive Locations" in the context of immigration enforcement?

In 2011, Immigration Customs and Enforcement (ICE) created <u>guidance</u> for agents to avoid enforcement actions in or near houses of worship, schools, hospitals and public demonstrations. In 2021, the Biden administration expanded the guidance by issuing a <u>new</u> <u>memo</u>, instructing officers to refrain from taking enforcement actions at or near "Protected Areas," and establishing as a "bedrock" principle that ICE should avoid enforcement actions that would prevent people from receiving essential services or engaging in essential activities -- see <u>FAQ</u>. This specific guidance has now been withdrawn with no replacement.

What is the impact of the Trump administration rescinding the "Sensitive Locations" and "Protected Areas" policy?

Immigrant communities may face a chilling effect – becoming fearful to attend worship, go to a congregation to receive services, seek medical care, take their kids to school, or share their stories at public events and rallies. For this reason, it is important that faith communities take steps to exercise their own rights to make their buildings more protected and inform immigrant members of their own rights.

Know Your Rights for Churches: Refusing Entry to ICE

Faith communities must do the work to ensure ICE is not allowed to enter private spaces of houses of worship, and to let impacted congregants know their rights. The 4th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution protects individuals and places of worship from unreasonable search and seizures, which means ICE or any law enforcement may not enter private areas of a church without a judicial warrant signed by a judge, except in certain extenuating circumstances, unless there is expressed consent. See the <u>ACLU Sanctuary Congregation</u> Legal FAQ. Consider hosting educational workshops for your community and adopting resolutions in your congregation to ensure ICE is not allowed on your campus. It is important to have a plan in place in advance, and that leaders in places of worship understand these rights and are prepared to not mistakenly provide consent.

What does this mean for the Sanctuary Movement?

Faith communities in the U.S. have been doing Sanctuary work to provide shelter, safety, and needed services to people seeking refuge from persecution since the 1980s, long before the 2011 "Sensitive Locations" memo and they will continue to do the work of Sanctuary according to the needs of the community. Faith leaders must continue to demand that houses of worship, schools, hospitals, public demonstrations and places that provide essential services, should continue to be safe places.

Pushing back against narratives of criminalization and dehumanization

As in all things, faith communities should be guided by their values. The language used by a DHS spokesperson in a <u>press release</u> rescinding "Sensitive Locations" attempts to criminalize all immigrants in a dehumanizing way. We know that people fighting to stay united with their families have inherent worth and dignity. Let us work to honor our divine obligation to treat immigrants with respect, compassion, and grace.

Can congregations still serve immigrants?

Yes. Congregations should continue to do their day-to-day ministries, understanding that serving immigrants does not need to be a legal risk and there are ways to steer clear of legal liability issues, such as including that work as part of larger efforts for all people in their communities. See the <u>ACLU Sanctuary Congregation Legal FAQ</u> for additional examples. *Note:* It is important to listen to impacted community members and adjust to the needs expressed which may call for current ministries to adapt to the increased climate of fear.

Will there be litigation and an injunction?

The <u>first litigation regarding the recission of the memo came from a faith community</u>, and different stakeholders from the formerly protected space may seek intervention from the Courts to stop the government from reversing this policy. Even without action by the courts, though, congregations can still exercise their existing rights.

What does RFRA have to do with immigration?

The <u>Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993 (RFRA)</u> provides broad protection for individuals performing religiously motivated actions. RFRA prohibits the government from substantially burdening the sincere exercise of religion unless doing so is necessary to advance a compelling government interest. In several recent cases, courts have held that RFRA protected the right of people of faith to serve migrants without government interference or prosecution. These cases included humanitarian aid workers who left food and water in the desert for migrants and a pastor who ministered at the Southern border.
