Albany FCC Board Meeting Minutes Feb. 10, 2025, on Zoom

#### **Motions Passed:**

- a. To move each month 1/12th of the annual budgeted amount for Care Cupboard, Community Meal, Emergency Fund, and Loads of Love from the General Fund to their respective reserved funds.
- b. Change the payment plan with the FCC Preprimary School to a 12-month cycle with the annual total remaining the same.

Call to Order: Graham called the meeting to order at 6:32 pm

**Opening Prayer:** Graham read a quote from the movie, *Conclave*. The quote was part of a homily by Cardinal Lawrence (the Cardinal in charge of running the conclave to choose a new pope) in which the Cardinal spoke of the need for doubt, not certainty, in all matters, especially faith.

**Minutes:** The minutes of the January 2025 board meeting and the January 2025 Congregational meeting were accepted as written.

**Pastors' Report:** In addition to her written report, Allison said that she is in the beginning stages of thought about assessing the costs of living into who we say we are. These questions revolve around our building safety procedures and our rights as a church. She asks that we continue to be in conversation with the Pastors and Executive Team about determining these costs.

- a. There are questions about basic safety precautions, such as do we lock the doors at 10:15, do we invest in security cameras around the building, and do we increase our building insurance?
- b. "Know Your Rights" basics--Allison suggests that if ICE shows up during worship or a community meal without a signed judicial warrant, we do not have to tell them anything, but should be polite, invite them to worship with us, and refer them to the Pastors. The preschool is working through scenarios, and the Executive Team and Pastors are discussing this issue. See the attached document provided by the Disciples denomination which lists FAQ for houses of worship and additional resources related to this topic.

**Financial Report:** We had another good month of giving with both income giving and net income being the highest for the 5-year period. The VISA bill did not get paid in January, so the net income was just under \$12,000, not \$12,587.01 as reported in the written financial report. Cam proposed we change the Budgeted Outreach items (other than Disciples Mission Fund) to transfer these accounts to reserve funds each month. After some discussion, Graham moved,

and Dave seconded that we transfer 1/12th of the total General Fund budgeted amount for Care Cupboard, Community Meal, Emergency Fund, and Loads of Love to their specific reserved funds. The motion passed. Then, after further discussion, Graham moved, and Gary seconded to amend the motion to move the 1/12th of the annual budgeted amount for Care Cupboard, Community Meal, Emergency Fund, and Loads of Love funds monthly to their respective reserved funds. The motion passed unanimously.

#### New Business:

- a. (Draft) Process for Discernment—Allison presented a draft for Congregational Discernment around Statements of Witness. The process outlines procedures to be followed for discernment based on what was learned during the Palestine-Israel discernment last year. The Executive Team drafted this preliminary proposal because they believe having rules for moving forward with a discernment process would be helpful. The board will discuss this draft next month.
- b. Amending FCC Preprimary School contract—Kris reported on recommended changes to the contract with the pre-primary school. Currently they are paying on a 9-month schedule but use the rooms prior to and after the contracted dates. The recommendation is to change the contract to a 12-month payment schedule, while keeping the annual amounts the same. This would allow the preschool to use the rooms during the summer for special events. The annual rent was raised \$50 a month (based on 9 monthly payments) this year to \$850 a month (\$7600 annually). Each year the rent increases \$50 a month (based on 9-month contract). The preschool is amenable to changing to a 12-month payment schedule. Gary moved, and Dianne seconded that the payment plan be changed to a 12-month cycle with the annual total remaining the same. The motion passed unanimously.
- c. Ruaris' housing allowance—Gayle reported we need to have the Pastors' annual housing allowance noted in a board meeting minutes each year. The allowance in 2025 for each pastor is \$20,000. Next year's allowance(s) should be mentioned during the Jan. 2026 board meeting. This is to protect the minister during a tax audit as it verifies this allowance is part of their employment agreement (housing allowances are nontaxable).
- d. FCC's relationship with Albany Helping Hands and possible renewal of relationship with Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon—Graham expressed his ongoing concerns with Albany Helping Hands and their administration/board. He recommends that, in lieu of fund raising for Helping Hands, we ask a representative of Ecumenical Ministries to make a special presentation and request a special offering. They are working on helping legal permanent immigrants to become citizens and are doing community outreach. By consensus, it was decided to have Graham prepare a proposal for the Stewardship Committee regarding dropping Helping Hands and working instead with Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon for our special presentations with special offerings.

#### Old Business:

a. Update on kitchen appliance maintenance estimate from Northwest Mechanical and pending repair of dishwasher leak—Gary reported that Northwest Mechanical quoted a ridiculously high amount for an annual maintenance contract and about \$580/590 to repair the leak. Gary will have another plumber make the repair on the dishwasher valve for \$150 plus labor and we will not have a maintenance contract. Graham says that

everything works in the kitchen. We will soon need to replace the filter on the coffee maker and the coils on top of the refrigerator need to have dust blown out of them occasionally. We should maybe have another kitchen cleanup this spring. Graham will follow up with the guy who cleans the grease trap on the floor, this spring, next fall, or even next year.

- b. Water heater replacement estimate—Gary said that to replace the High Efficiency 100gallon commercial water heater in the basement would cost \$8000. The current water heater could last an indefinite amount of time, and we will not replace it until it starts leaking.
- c. Choir/music director hiring update—Graham has had no return calls from Willamette University nor Corbin University. Allison said she will be performing with the Corvallis Repertory, and she will ask people in the Choir for suggestions. She also is in conversation with the LBCC choir director. Allison is talking with Personnel about adjusting the compensation for a choir Director. In the meantime, the choir will sing/ rehearse under her guidance on Wednesday evenings and the choir, accompanied by a cellist, will sing an anthem on March 16.

#### Board Report Highlights (for items not included in written reports):

- a. Personnel—Gayle reported that the major focus this year for the Personnel Committee is to update all job descriptions. They had their first meeting in February.
- b. Mission Grant Committee—Graham said that the committee has received three grant applications that they are considering (Creating Housing for solar panels, Jackson Street for their Life Skills Program, Affirming LBGTQ Team for Mid-Willamette Transgender Support Group, and they also have a fourth application for Chance. Graham also thanked Paula for all her years as Chair of the committee.
- c. Hospitality Committee—Graham reported that Sunday greeting, coffee hour, memorial committee, warming center, and building hosts are now all under the umbrella of the Hospitality Committee and the system is working well. The warming center will open whenever the high is expected to not exceed freezing for two consecutive days or to be 95 degrees or higher for two consecutive days.
- d. Graham said that more than \$200 was raised yesterday for C.O.A.T.

#### Action Items:

- a. Graham will follow up on getting the grease trap on the kitchen floor cleaned out later this year or early next year.
- b. Graham will prepare a proposal for the Stewardship Committee asking that Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon be substituted for Helping Hands for our special presentations with offerings.

**Joys, Concerns and Announcements:** Allison asked that we keep Bailey Wood in our prayers as she begins her long road of recovery. Edie expressed concern about Alan Gatchel and Allison said he is home from the hospital, on antibiotics, and has people looking out for him.

Closing Prayer: Allison closed the meeting in prayer.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 7:48 pm.

# Sensitive Locations FAQ for Houses of Worship February 5, 2025

NOTE: This is not legal advice and does not substitute consultation with a lawyer.

# What has changed and what has remained the same regarding immigration enforcement in houses of worship?

On the first day of the new Trump administration, <u>the Department of Homeland Security</u> <u>withdrew a memo</u> setting guidelines that restricted enforcement action in certain locations, including places of worship. While the policy and restrictions on the agency has changed, the rights of the houses of worship have not. Houses of worship have Fourth Amendment rights to protect private spaces in their building from entry by immigration enforcement officers and any other law enforcement.

# What are "Sensitive Locations" in the context of immigration enforcement?

In 2011, Immigration Customs and Enforcement (ICE) created <u>guidance</u> for agents to avoid enforcement actions in or near houses of worship, schools, hospitals and public demonstrations. In 2021, the Biden administration expanded the guidance by issuing a <u>new</u> <u>memo</u>, instructing officers to refrain from taking enforcement actions at or near "Protected Areas," and establishing as a "bedrock" principle that ICE should avoid enforcement actions that would prevent people from receiving essential services or engaging in essential activities -- see <u>FAQ</u>. This specific guidance has now been withdrawn with no replacement.

# What is the impact of the Trump administration rescinding the "Sensitive Locations" and "Protected Areas" policy?

Immigrant communities may face a chilling effect – becoming fearful to attend worship, go to a congregation to receive services, seek medical care, take their kids to school, or share their stories at public events and rallies. For this reason, it is important that faith communities take steps to exercise their own rights to make their buildings more protected and inform immigrant members of their own rights.

# Know Your Rights for Churches: Refusing Entry to ICE

Faith communities must do the work to ensure ICE is not allowed to enter private spaces of houses of worship, and to let impacted congregants know their rights. The 4th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution protects individuals and places of worship from unreasonable search and seizures, which means ICE or any law enforcement may not enter private areas of a church without a judicial warrant signed by a judge, except in certain extenuating circumstances, unless there is expressed consent. See the <u>ACLU Sanctuary Congregation</u> Legal FAQ. Consider hosting educational workshops for your community and adopting resolutions in your congregation to ensure ICE is not allowed on your campus. It is important to have a plan in place in advance, and that leaders in places of worship understand these rights and are prepared to not mistakenly provide consent.

# What does this mean for the Sanctuary Movement?

Faith communities in the U.S. have been doing Sanctuary work to provide shelter, safety, and needed services to people seeking refuge from persecution since the 1980s, long before the 2011 "Sensitive Locations" memo and they will continue to do the work of Sanctuary according to the needs of the community. Faith leaders must continue to demand that houses of worship, schools, hospitals, public demonstrations and places that provide essential services, should continue to be safe places.

# Pushing back against narratives of criminalization and dehumanization

As in all things, faith communities should be guided by their values. The language used by a DHS spokesperson in a <u>press release</u> rescinding "Sensitive Locations" attempts to criminalize all immigrants in a dehumanizing way. We know that people fighting to stay united with their families have inherent worth and dignity. Let us work to honor our divine obligation to treat immigrants with respect, compassion, and grace.

# Can congregations still serve immigrants?

Yes. Congregations should continue to do their day-to-day ministries, understanding that serving immigrants does not need to be a legal risk and there are ways to steer clear of legal liability issues, such as including that work as part of larger efforts for all people in their communities. See the <u>ACLU Sanctuary Congregation Legal FAQ</u> for additional examples. *Note:* It is important to listen to impacted community members and adjust to the needs expressed which may call for current ministries to adapt to the increased climate of fear.

# Will there be litigation and an injunction?

The <u>first litigation regarding the recission of the memo came from a faith community</u>, and different stakeholders from the formerly protected space may seek intervention from the Courts to stop the government from reversing this policy. Even without action by the courts, though, congregations can still exercise their existing rights.

# What does RFRA have to do with immigration?

The <u>Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993 (RFRA)</u> provides broad protection for individuals performing religiously motivated actions. RFRA prohibits the government from substantially burdening the sincere exercise of religion unless doing so is necessary to advance a compelling government interest. In several recent cases, courts have held that RFRA protected the right of people of faith to serve migrants without government interference or prosecution. These cases included humanitarian aid workers who left food and water in the desert for migrants and a pastor who ministered at the Southern border.

- Worship:

  - We continue to discern faithful ways for sharing the mission and witness of Jesus Christ that is a loving response to our neighbors and world and aligns with our mission and identity statement. We welcome conversation and suggestions for community partnerships and how we can most effectively and joyfully harness our collective energy.
  - Ministries will continue as described with the Program Cabinet offering leadership and oversight.
- · Pastoral Care:
  - We're continuing to work with elders to provide other supplemental points of contact beyond office and pastoral check ins. We appreciate the ways you check in and care for each other, whether it be related to formal church programming or more organic relationships.
  - We're also assessing the best ways to care for the congregation in the midst of the dramatically shifting national and political landscape. Love is the foundation and framework. We seek to respond in love, not react out of fear, anxiety, or anger.
- Education:
  - Allison will lead the lenten bible study and is finalizing selections on Sunday mornings at 9:00 am and Thursday afternoons at 1:00 pm. She is open to hearing suggestions.
- Misc:
  - Both Allison and Jared attended the Northwest Association for Theological Discussion February 3-5. We appreciate the opportunity for dedicated time to build collegial relationships within the denomination and for deeper theological discussions. Douglass Anne also says hello!
